- Types of collaboration available to singleton teachers:
  - Interdisciplinary–work with a colleague
    - Example: English/Social Studies
  - Vertical—same subject, but with teachers above of below your grade level
    - Example: 3rd and 4th grade teachers
  - Whoever you can find that will listen to you
    - Example: a teacher in another district or someone you met at a conference



- Collaboration does not have to be huge!
  - We gave you 5 minutes to collaborate with a partner, 10 minutes to create your shared vision, and 5 minutes to present
  - Be consistent with your collaboration
